

How to Write a Hook for an Essay: Guide, Tips, and Examples

You're working on an essay but don't know exactly how to make it so catchy that people can't help but continue reading ahead. The technical term for those phrases is 'essay hooks'. An essay hook is the first sentence or couple of words that are so attractive or catchy that it can hook any person psychologically and compel them to read the whole thing. This isn't as hard as you might be thinking actually. You don't need any [paper writing service](#) for this, just follow these creative tips and tricks to ace that essay!.



- **Start with a Question:**

Humans are naturally curious beings. When something is questioned, they have a natural itch to know the answer to that. So, when you begin your essay with a fun or creative or a spicy question, designed to grab attention, it ensures that the reader is engaged. They will be bound to read it till the very end.

The question must be relevant to your essay. There should be a connection between every paragraph. Otherwise, the hook will fall apart. After you do throw in the curiosity triggering question, don't just give in to the answer at once or drag it too much. The information needs to be relayed bit by bit. Para by para. In a proper sequence.

1. **A Strong Statement.**

A declaration hook or a hook with a strong head-on statement is a good way to get someone reading. For this, you need to make a very assertive statement that is relevant and in connection with your thesis statement and clearly shows the crux of your essay while [write my essay](#). For example, *On-campus*

classes are better and cheaper than online classes. This will bring in both types of readers that support or oppose to know the facts behind this statement.

While writing a declarative statement keep in mind that it should sound confident but not something absolute and leaves room for debate. It does not necessarily matter if your reader agrees with the statement or not, the purpose is to grab their attention. So, everyone who either agrees or disagrees with the statement would be curious enough to read the whole essay.

- **State the facts:**

Begin with a factual statement about something in correlation with your thesis. Not only does this leave a good impression of your command on the subject but also backs your claim with statistical evidence. People are attracted towards statistical statements because it shows accurate information and if you begin with it then the fish is definitely on the hook for sure.

But you have to be extra careful with this one. When you [write my paper](#) make sure that your source of information is very authentic because being wrong can make readers question your credibility.

For example:

2.12 Billion people in the world are now fully vaccinated.

- **Use Metaphors:**

What metaphors do is that they give your audience a different angle to think about a very regular topic. It generates curiosity as to what made you say that? or why would you connect or compare such two diverse topics or things? But in fact, metaphors work as a figure of speech regarding something that is poles apart and bringing them together to show a rare connection.

For example:

*It will be the end of the world before I **write paper by taking help from [myperfectpaper.net](#).***

Or

Everyone is a zombie on Mondays.

Now the world isn't ending nor are people zombies, it's just a statement that shows a correlation.

- **Tell a story:**

Essay writing is just like telling a story and that is what an [essay writer](#) does, he tells a story about the topic he is writing about. Putting a relevant story at the beginning of the essay serves as an excellent hook. Stories are interesting and easier to read, they bring people together and make them feel connected to you.

If the story is well written and starts from an interesting angle yet also connects to your topic or essay it will keep the audience engaged.

The story is more gripping if it's from a personal perspective or is based on personal experience that would explain why you decided to write the essay in the first place. But it can also be someone else's story. The key point here is that you have to be the narrator.

For example:

I met an old middle school friend of mine after ages. And were just recalling our old times together and realized that our school didn't have any sex education back in those days so we were very clueless about our periods and how to deal with them when hitting puberty. The lunch was great but I kept thinking

about it when I got home and wondered how statistically women were educated about this and how they dealt with the situation when their daughters were hitting puberty. So I started this research.....

- **Start with a quote.**

Starting your essay with a famous person's quote is always a good way to start an essay. The [essay writing](#) author doesn't always have to be someone famous. The quote itself has to be very catchy regardless of who said it. It should also be relevant to your topic.

Quotations actually define whatever you're about to say should be taken seriously and is of high importance because it's rooted in other intellectual's inspiration or work.

You can also be savvy and mix the techniques between these hooks and create a hybrid version of your own style as well. As long as readers are getting hooked by your creative style, it will be just perfect.
